Keep up the good work with the lethal weapons. Only, I would suggest that it be Japanese cities instead of German villages that you exercise your bloodthirstiness on. We have to keep the Far Eastern angle in mind, you know.

I hope you have had a chance to read and digest the wonderful news in the papers the last few days. It certainly gives me a new lease on life - particularly the shakeup in the Japanese armed forces. "See you in Manila" doesn't seem a forlorn hope any more, but a definite promise.

Do come in to see me when and if you get up to Washington. I certainly would like to see you. I do hope that Mrs. Bernstein is much better. Tell her from me that I'd like to hear her voice on the telephone when she gets back to the job.

The office joins in my good wishes.
