Dir. War Mobilization and Reconversion, 1945; Dep. Mil. Gov. of Germany, 1945-47; Commander-in-Chief, European Command, and Military Governor of United States Zone of Germany, 1947-49; retired, 1949; An Assistant Director of Defence Mobilization, U.S.A., 1950-51. *Publication*: Decision in Germany, 1950. *Recreations*: horseback riding, fishing. *Clubs*: Army and Navy; Army and Navy Country (Washington, D.C.).

to King George VI; Chaplain to British Petroleum Oil Co.; to Port of London Authority; Founder Padre of Toc H, when Toc H (Talbot House) began in the Ypres Salient 1915; Vicar since 1922 of All Hallows, Barkinby-the-Tower (bombed and burnt, 1940); the Guild Church of Toc H; b. Queen's land, 12 Dec. 1885; y. s. of late R. B. Clayton, J.P.; unmarried. Educ.: St. Paul's School (Scholar); Exeter College, Oxford (Scholar), 1st Cl. Theological Final, 1909. Curate of Portsea, 1910-14; Temp. C.F. 1915; Chaplain to 16th General Hospital; Brigade Chaplain 6th Division; opened Talbot House in Popeinghe, which was named after Gilbert Talbot y. s. of the Bishop of Winchester, Dec. 1918. Chaplain and Tutor of Service Candidates' School at Knutsford, 1919; refounded Talbot House 1920, as Toc H (Royal Charter, 1922)—a movement to teach the younger generation class reconciliation and unselfish service; first planned and launched Tower Hill Improvement, 1926; secured opening of Tower Beach for children, 1934; brought Toc H to support British Empire Leprosy Relief, 1932-39; inaugurated Winant Volunteers (1948) and Oslo Volunteers (1950) to help East End Clubs and Settlements. Toured the Empire, U.S., S. America on behalf of Toc H, 1922, 1925, 1927, and 1952. Persia 1932. Gold Coast and Nigeria 1933.
