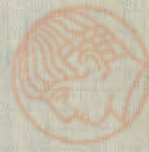

YOUR LOCAL RED CROSS CHAPTER, through its Home Service program, offers these services to the families of the men and women in the armed forces.



SERGEANT DEE, stationed on an island in the Pacific, had not heard from home in three months. His wife, at their home in Texas, was expecting her first baby—and the nearer the time the more frantic her husband for word from home. Like many a soldier, Sergeant Dee could take an enemy barrage better than he could take such suspense. Finally, he asked his Red Cross field director on the post what could be done about putting him in touch with home. The field director radioed for news.

Back in Texas a small town Red Cross chapter got busy for an anxious and expectant father, half a world away. Within a short time Home Service was ready with the news for Sergeant Dee: his son was five days old; wife and baby were doing well. Two days later—somewhere down near the equator—the field director received the message and rushed the good news to Sergeant Dee.



THE RED CROSS links the serviceman with his family. Action may be initiated by the serviceman's field director in this country or abroad, or by the family's Red Cross chapter at home.



MRS. MILLER wired her son, Frank, at camp in Wisconsin, that his father had been taken suddenly and critically ill. Frank, an only son, asked his commanding officer for an emergency furlough to his home in Oregon. The commanding officer turned to the Red Cross field director to ascertain the seriousness of the father's illness and the need for Frank's presence at home. This was done by a telegram to Frank's local Red Cross chapter. Home Service, wiring the field director back within the hour, reported that the father was not expected to live. The commanding officer granted the furlough.

But Frank, a recent selectee, did not have sufficient money to make the long trip home. Again the Red Cross could help. His field director lent him money for his fare and meals en route and—with time precious—planned for him the fastest possible trip.



THE RED CROSS is the means by which military and naval authorities, in this country or overseas, may obtain information they need in deciding questions of furlough or discharge, or—if the serviceman is hospitalized—of medical diagnosis and treatment.



PHIL SMITH left the Army hospital to go home to his wife and child in Iowa. He had a disability discharge but—confident that he could get along well in his old job—he had declined to file a claim for a pension. Back home, his troubles started. His illness turned out to be recurrent; finally his doctor urged further hospitalization. How could Smith provide for his wife and child during that period?

He took his problems to the Red Cross. Home Service helped him get into a veterans' hospital, helped him to apply for a pension, and—to his infinite relief—arranged to provide for his family while the claim was pending and while he was hospitalized. To expedite his claim, Smith gave the Red Cross power of attorney—which meant that a Red Cross field director would represent him in the Veterans Administration office.



THE RED CROSS chapters offer claims service. Home Service is kept fully informed on regulations and claims procedures, and—working through Red Cross field directors in the Veterans Administration—on all developments in a particular claimant's case.



THE HOSPITAL AUTHORITIES of a small Vermont town sent a hurried call for the Red Cross Home Service worker. Could the Red Cross do

anything to help one of their patients? Mrs. West, mother of three small children, had been brought in for an emergency operation. Her husband, in the Navy, was on sea duty. There was no one to take care of the children.

The Red Cross could do plenty to help. Home Service secured a housekeeper to live in the home with the children—to keep the youngest at home and to send the others to school. By keeping in touch with the family, Home Service could report to Mrs. West that her children were having good care. When she returned home she found her family well fed and happy, her home clean, and the housekeeper prepared to stay on through her convalescence.



THE RED CROSS gives practical help where it is most needed. For needs not met by public funds, Red Cross can give financial aid. The purpose of family service is to provide for your family the help and encouragement you would give if you were at home.

The Job of Enemy Intelligence

The enemy has been doing his best to get all kinds of information about the Army—its equipment, strength, morale, units, movements, disposition, losses, and plans. He is trying particularly hard right now. He will keep everlastingly at it.

To know everything possible about us is the job of enemy intelligence. The more the enemy knows, the better he can adjust his plans so as to hit us when and where it will hurt the most.

The Importance of Surprise

An informed enemy can rob us of surprise, which is one of the most powerful weapons your commander can possess. If we can surprise the enemy, we can usually achieve maximum military success with minimum loss to ourselves.

To achieve surprise we must keep military information from the enemy. We must defeat, as completely as possible, the efforts of enemy intelligence to gain information about us. We must keep the enemy in the dark.

Security Is YOUR Job, Too

We call this process of keeping the enemy in the dark SECURITY. It's a big job, undertaken to protect your

Army and you. Security is an all-Army job which cannot succeed without your help.

AR 380-5, Safeguarding Military Information, describes the different classifications of military information, and prescribes the ways in which classified information must be safeguarded. Classified military information is any information which the enemy could use to good advantage, and which is not a matter of public knowledge. There are a great many security regulations. The number of such regulations that you must know depends on your particular duties. You are responsible for the safeguarding of all classified military information in your possession. *You know more classified information than you think you know.*

Don't Discuss Military Matters

One of your most important security duties is to maintain absolute silence on military matters. Whatever military information you have you must keep to yourself. Either public or private discussion of classified military information with or within the hearing of any unauthorized person is strictly forbidden. The penalties for violations are severe. Cultivate the habit of keeping your mouth shut on military matters. Remember that *Silence Means Security.*

Never give classified information to anyone, regardless of rank, whose official duties do not require that he have such information. Remember that no person is entitled solely by virtue of his grade or position to knowledge or possession of classified matter. *Only those who must know should know.*

Don't think for a minute that you have to answer military questions just to be polite. Both military personnel and civilians of all Allied nations will respect your good security sense if you say "I'm sorry, sir, but I couldn't answer that." Wherever you are, if military questioning appears to be based on more than just idle curiosity or an attempt to show interest and friendliness, tell your intelligence officer—and tell him fast. The safety of many men may depend on your promptness.

The Broad Scope of Security

Elaborate security procedures and regulations protect every movement to a staging area, every movement to an overseas theater. These security precautions are the result of careful planning and experience. They will not be effective unless every man in the Army does his part to make security work.

When you are overseas, even more elaborate security processes are at work to keep information from the enemy. News stories, photographs, and mail are carefully cen-

sored, so that information of value to the enemy does not become known, published, or talked about back home. It is relatively easy for the enemy to find out what is published or talked about in any Allied country. Effective censorship at the oversea source is essential to give enemy intelligence lean pickings back home.

Name, Rank, Serial Number Only

If you should be captured, you must give only your *name, rank, and serial number*. Beyond that, there is no information which the enemy can legally force from you. Forget all you ever knew about the Army. If anyone wants to discuss even apparently unimportant details with you, say nothing. The "Allied" soldier next to you may be an enemy intelligence agent.

Don't carry with you into action, any papers or other items which identify your unit. Letters tell much about you, and the envelopes show your unit and organization.

Escapes and Evasions

If you should be captured by the enemy and escape, don't tell or write how you did it. The method you use may be helpful to others, if the enemy doesn't know too much about it. The same thing goes for any story that you might know about evasion of capture in enemy territory; the people who help you can still help others.

Don't Repeat Rumors

Wherever you are, remember that the enemy's propaganda efforts will be highly successful if you pass on rumors. Don't repeat or pass on in your letters, any story which tends to divide any Allied forces or peoples on a basis of race, religion, or nationality. Challenge all rumors and *never repeat them*.

The Purpose of Censorship

When you are overseas, you'll find it easier to write home if you bear in mind constantly that the purpose of censorship is to prevent the passage of any information which would give aid or comfort to the enemy. Censorship is for your protection, remember. It will work best if you help to make it work by your own good sense and caution. The rules are simple and sensible.

Don't write letters about these ten subjects:

1. Military installations or the location, strength, matériel, or equipment of Army or Allied units.
2. Transportation facilities: roads, air routes, bridges, railroads.
3. Convoys: routes, ports, time en route, naval or air protection, or war incidents occurring en route.
4. Movements of troops, aircraft, matériel, transports, or naval or merchant ships.

5. Plans and forecasts or orders about future operations, whether known or just your guess.

6. Criticisms or statements which tend to disparage the forces or the foreign relations of the United States or any ally.

7. Alleged atrocities.

8. The effects of enemy operations.

9. Any casualty, unless first released by The Adjutant General, and then only by using the full name of the casualty.

10. Any geographical location more specific than that authorized.

Above all, remember this: the use of codes, ciphers, and shorthand in private correspondence is forbidden. Never attempt to conceal the true meaning of your letter. Violations of this regulation will result in severe punishment. If you avoid the ten subjects listed above and write in the clear, you'll probably stay in the clear.

How to Address Envelopes

When you write to civilians in the United States, write the recipient's complete address in the usual way, leaving room for possible addition of a forwarding address. The example shown below is a good one to follow.

When you write to military personnel located in the United States, give grade or rank, Army serial number,

unit and organization, and location. If the addressee is overseas, give his APO number, c/o Postmaster, city assigned, state. If the addressee is in the same general oversea locality where you are, see Army Postal Service for the authorized address.

When you write to prisoners of war held by the enemy, obtain special instructions from the local Army Postal Service.

Your Return Address

Your return address must appear in the upper left-hand corner, as shown in the sample below. Leave a 1/2-inch margin on the left side for resealing, in case your letter

is examined by the base censor. The 1/2-inch margin requirement applies equally to officers and to enlisted men, as the mail of both is subject to base censorship.

The word "Free" must be personally hand-written in the position shown in the sample.

If you are writing to a prisoner of war held by the enemy, your return address is subject to specific regulations to be obtained from the local Army Postal Service.

Remember this return address rule, which applies no matter to whom you write: *Your geographical location may not be shown on an envelope or other outside cover.*

Mailing Your Letter

Before you put the letter into the envelope, read it over to make sure you have complied with all regulations. Naturally, letters containing no violations travel faster, because they don't have to be rewritten or held. And since you are responsible for any violations your letters may contain, a few minutes' examination of your own letter before mailing is time well spent.

If you're an enlisted man, insert the letter into the addressed envelope, then drop the envelope, *unsealed*, in your organization mail box. *You are required to use the Army Postal Service only.*

If you're an officer, seal the envelope, sign your name in the lower left-hand corner to indicate your compliance with censorship regulations, and *deposit your mail in your organization mail box. You are required to use the Army Postal Service only.*

Sometimes you'll want to send something with your letter. Be sure you don't inclose anything which of itself is a violation of censorship regulations. For example, special rules apply to the transmission of photographs and films. Don't send them until you have found out what those regulations are.

The use of post cards may or may not be authorized. If they are, they must be addressed in the same way as an envelope, and make sure that the picture or printed part of the card doesn't violate any regulations.

Use V-Mail

The Army Postal Service urges you to use V-Mail when you write. V-Mail is safe and fast. Its use releases vitally needed cargo space on ships and airplanes. V-Mail is, of course, subject to censorship, as are all personal communications of officers and enlisted men. Tell your folks to use V-Mail when they write to you; it travels overseas by air.

Blue Envelopes

If you wish to write a highly personal letter which you prefer to have examined by the base censor rather than your unit censor, you may be authorized to obtain a "Blue Envelope" from your organization. On such mail, seal the envelope, after addressing it completely just as you would any other envelope, and drop it in the organization mail box. Such an envelope may contain only one letter. Don't abuse the privilege by too frequent use of it.

Don't Write to People You Don't Know

The dangers of corresponding with persons you don't know are obvious. Don't do it. If you receive mail from unknown persons, consult your unit censor.

WARNING

Written communications may be sent only through the Army Postal Service. *Never* deposit mail in civilian mail boxes. Attempts to violate this regulation will result in *severe disciplinary action against the sender and also against any intermediary.*

Cables and Radiograms

Constant effort is being made to provide men overseas with rapid, inexpensive, approved electrical communication facilities. In the interests of security, cables may under no circumstances be sent over commercial or foreign facilities until their use is authorized by proper military authority. "Safe arrival" messages, identifiable as such, are absolutely prohibited.

There are two types of electrical messages generally available. A Sender's Composition Message (SCM) is like a telegram containing your own message. An Expeditionary Force Message (EFM) is a standard text message at a very low rate, similar to fixed text telegrams in the United States, but with set messages to meet the normal requirements of military personnel.

As soon as security permits, you will be informed that you may send SCM and EFM messages. Until that time, no message may be sent except in case of serious emergency, and then only with the written approval of your theater or area commander or his authorized representative. The Red Cross can handle certain extremely urgent personal matters by cable.

Your unit censor will tell you how to send an SCM or EFM. Under no circumstances may you mention your unit, organization, any military establishment, or any APO number.

Cable Addresses

When you're sending a cable, first give the full name and complete address of the addressee; then the message, and finally, sign your full name. Here's an example:

*Mrs. Albert B. Smith,
3000 Main Street,
Jamestown, New York.*

Message goes here.

John A. Smith.

Note that addresses and signatures do not include Army serial numbers, unit or organization designation, or APO numbers, nor do they show your location in any manner whatsoever.

Cables and radiograms addressed *to* you should give your full name, Army serial number, and APO number, but not your unit or organization.

Stampeded Nazis Abandon 21,000 Allied Prisoners

By **EDWARD D. BALL**

WITH THE U. S. THIRD ARMY
IN GERMANY, May 4 (AP) — The third army found 21,000 Allied prisoners, including 4,100 American airmen, today in a wood five miles south of Braunau where they had been abandoned by the Germans after being marched into the Bavarian redoubt.

All were ravenously hungry and suffering the effects of several days in the wood without shelter.

The Americans, who included Tom W. Bagwell, Hobbs, N. M., appeared in fair physical condition for the most part.

Wounded and diseased Russians, Poles and Czechs were in a pitiful state. A number of bodies of their comrades who died after the Germans fled were scattered through the wood.

The prisoners, reached by the 13th armored and 80th infantry divisions, had been marched out of a number of camps all over Germany as the Russian and western Allies approached each other.

Americans, desiring to notify their families of their safety, scribbled their names on frayed envelopes, cardboard ration boxes, labels and other scraps of paper.

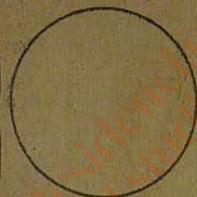

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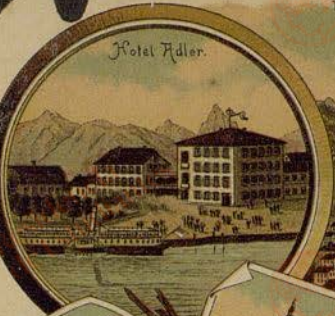
