Official German Communiques

The official communiques issued by the German General Headquarters for Saturday and Sunday, December 21 and 22, states:

DECEMBER 21.

In the night of December 19/20 German bomber formations successfully attacked objectives of military importance in London. Also during daytime German planes dropped bombs on London. Furthermore, an armament factory in Chelmsford was heavily hit. Air reconnaissance was extended over the whole of England as far as the Shetlands.

In the night of December 20/21 strong bomber formations attacked harbour installations and industrial plants at Liverpool, as well as other militarily important objectives in the Midlands and in the South of England with thousands of high explosive and incendiary bombs. Numerous large and many small fires, as well as violent explosions could be observed by the crews, and testified to the success of the attacks.

The enemy attacks during the past night were mainly concentrated on Berlin. Bombs were dropped exclusively on non-military objectives. A number of private houses, as well as the Berlin cathedral were damaged. Six civilians were killed and 17 injured. Most of these persons had not taken shelter.

Anti-aircraft artillery shot down two enemy planes.

DECEMBER 22.

As already announced, strong German bomber formations successfully attacked Liverpool in the night of

December 20/21. Moreover the German air force attacked objectives of military importance in London, Bristol and Southampton, as well as a number of aerodromes.

Mine-laying operations off British harbours were continued.

On December 21 the activity in the air was restricted to armed reconnaissance, whereby London was again the objective of bombing attacks.

Long-range batteries of the army and navy yesterday evening shelled an enemy convoy sailing close to the English coast and the harbour of Dover.

In the night of December 21/22 Liverpool was once more attacked by strong formations of heavy bombers. Extensive fires could be observed, particularly in the dock area.

Bombers of the Italian Flying Corps attacked the harbour installations of Harwich with great success.

During the same night the enemy dropped high explosive and incendiary bombs at several places in Germany. In two towns in Western Germany insignificant damage to buildings was caused. Objectives of military importance were not hit. One civilian was killed and 11 injured.

Two enemy bombers were shot down by night fighters yesterday. One German plane is missing.

As has just been announced, on December 20 three enemy merchant ships with a total of 15,000 tons were attacked from the air on the coast of England. Two of the ships travelling in convoy were sunk, and the loss of the third ship must be assumed.

Operations in North Africa

The Cairo Wireless reports in connection with the military operations in North Africa, that reinforcements from the British bases to the advanced units, and above all the munition transports, become continually more difficult. The slowing down of military operations must therefore be expected. The resistance of the Italians is continually increasing.

a million tons of British shipping lies in the Mediterranean and in the African Area. 425,000 men have been brought together against Italy, and these originate from England, Australia, New Zealand, and other parts of the Empire. Churchill states in this connection that the equipment for this army has been transported there since June and August. Armoured cars, and modern guns which, as he states, are even lacking in England, have been thrown on the front against Italy.

Distribution of Leaflets containing Hitler's Speech

According to reports from London, two workmen were arrested by the police in Redcliff Street, Bristol, in the vicinity of the Docks, because they had distributed leaflets containing excerpts from Hitler's latest speech. A similar incident occurred in Manchester, where, in the midst of a crowd of people on the square of the Central Station, leaflets, likewise containing Hitler's speech, were distributed. Here the police arrested men in whose pockets were still found large stocks of these leaflets.

COMMENDABLE LITERARY ENTERPRISE OF VAUVERT SCHOOL

Time Marches On: Scholars Produce their Own Magazine

Over the week-end I received a Christmas greeting from the children of Vauvert School. Something different by way of greeting, a change from the usual Yuletide card. I had sent on to me a copy of the first issue of Vauvert School Magazine.

It has been published to commemorate Christmas, 1940, and it is the first in the history of parochial schools that it has been my lot to come across.

St. Peter's School started a school magazine some years ago. Unfortunately it went the way of other good efforts.

DEBUT.

I have been asked to "look upon this effort kindly—it is our first."

Not only do I look upon it kindly, but I welcome the magazine with certain pride and joy, realising that while the rest of Guernsey is practically at an enforced standstill, the 100 or so scholars of what is now the Central Town School not only refuse to stand still, but have made up their minds that, come what may, war or no war, progress must, AND WILL, be made.

The Magazine . . . "will help to knit us more together into what can truly be called a school," says an editorial note in this first issue, the inference being that Vauvert school-rooms have become centres for the non-evacuated scholastic orphans, with the resultant scholars a conglomeration of youth devoid of the usual bars of class, creed, or educational attainment.

SUCCESS OF FIRST ISSUE.

And therein, to my way of thinking, lies the success of the first issue of the School magazine, in which, as if to prove my point, the schoolboy-editor, Graham Marriette (normally a student at Elizabeth College) expresses the hope that "in days to come it (the magazine) may prove a tangible link with our life today, which may then appear even stranger than it does now."

Graham Marriette, by the way, is more than editor. I note that he has been partly responsible for the "printing" (typewritten original, with graphed copies), has helped to introduce a puzzle page with an ingenious crossword, and adds to the pictorial interest of the magazine, a pen and ink drawing entitled "Time Marches On," whereby one notes the contrast of life of a past day with that of the present co-called progress. Graham Marriette has the making of a journalist.

SCHOLAR-CONTRIBUTORS.

A number of the scholars have contributed to the magazine in some form or another. For example we have Betty Boswell's letter to Santa Claus; a descriptive essay on "Mon Voyage de Paris à Guernesey" by S. Maubec, who, I take it, is a French refugee; with 9-year-old Greta Carré, in a brief essay describing bluebells in the spring; and Daphne Mahy (aged 14) assuring us vividly through a like medium that there is beauty to be found even in a blackout.

Thus, in an effort, which, as it is the first is also in the first-class, it may be invidious to make comparison between individual contributions.

In cases where this is not immediately possible, for instance for repairs or other jobs of long duration, the Services of the German Army (Paymasters) have been instructed to hand to the interested firms in Order bearing the Official Stamp. The crossword-puzzle maker defies anyone to solve his puzzle in less than 30 minutes; to use his

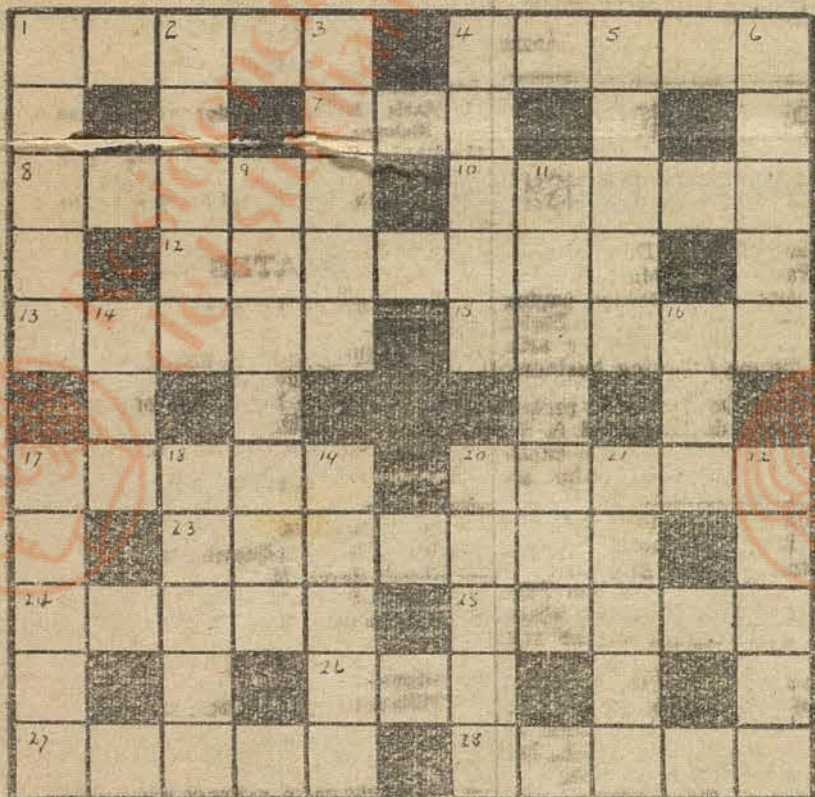
own words: "If anyone can do it in less time than that I shall be pleased to give him a good stiff whisky on Christmas morning."

ONE YEAR AGO

TROPICAL FRUIT WERE GROWING IN A GUERNSEY COLDHOUSE

Grapefruit, Oranges And Citron Fruit In Ville-Au-Roi

Tropical plants grown in Guernsey—and what is more, ripening at Christmas-time, was a discovery made by a "Star" reporter a year ago.

Grapefruit, oranges and citron fruit were among the luscious crop which was grown by Mme. Pommier in a coldhouse conservatory at her home "Dunleary," Ville-au-Roi.

A citrus pampelmous dulce tree—grapefruit to the layman—was flourishing in Mme. Pommier's conservatory, and this prolific tree had, last year, a grand total of twenty well-shaped and ripening fruit.

The gardener, Mr. John Bourgaize, was responsible also for the tender care necessary to a St. Michael's orange bush with seven fruit; and a citron tree which showed great promise, having seven well-distributed large fruit on the tree. Also in the conservatory is a five-year-old peach tree, grown from the stone, a nectarine bush, and a lemon tree with fruit just beginning to set.

Mr. Hughes had climbed up a main ladder set against Havelet House, and was stepping on to a lighter one lying across the roof when it gave way beneath his weight. He fell heavily on to a cobbled yard, and was badly hurt.

FEWER CATTLE.
