faint hope for peace, Europe's frayed nerves faced another tense week-end. Developments were:

LONDON—Britain delayed a declaration of war against Germany "at least until noon today" but Prime Minister Chamberlain told the House of Commons: "I anticipate there is only one answer I shall have at that time." Meanwhile Foreign Secretary Viscount Halifax informed the House of Lords that Premier Mussolini had again proposed a five-power conference to settle the differences between Germany and Poland.

PARIS—Reasserting her determination to defend Poland from Nazi aggression, France left the door of peace ajar when officials declared they were willing to negotiate for peace providing Hitler would withdraw his troops to within German boundaries.

WARSAW—Claiming that women and children were among the victims, Polish officials accused Nazi invaders of wholesale massacres on Polish towns.

BERLIN—Nazi military leaders asserted that their troops, pushing steadily into Polish territory, had "bottled up" the Corridor while diplomatic officials were believed to be drafting a reply to the British-French "final warnings."

WASHINGTON—With official hopes revived that a European war still can be averted, President Roosevelt drafted a "fireside" message to be broad cast to the nation at 10 o'click (Pistsburgh time) night on the nation's foreign policy.

### Duke's Private Pilot Called to Riviera From England

PARIS, Sept. 2.—(AP.)—British sources close to the royal family said the Duke of Windsor was flying back to England today for the first sight of his homeland since his abdication from the throne December 11, 1936.

It was believed the Duchess, the former Wallis Warfield, his American-born wife, would go with

These sources said the former British King sent for his private pilot who left Farnborough, England, this morning for the Riviera, where the Duke and Duchess have been living.

The plane's departure time for England was not disclosed. Thus, the imminent threat of war has ended a voluntary exile of nearly three years into which Windsor plunged for "the woman I love." He abdicated s King on December 10, 1936, and arrived in France two days later.

He has taken little action of political importance since November 5, 1937, when labor objections caused him to abandon a proposed survey of labor conditions in

He lately stepped into the pub-lic eye again with a radio appeal as "a simple citizen of the world" King Victor Emanuel of Italy to try to save world peace.

The Duke, always intensely patriotic, has indicated his desire to serve his country again if needed. He once said:

"I am now a very happily married man, but my wife and I are neither content nor willing to lead a purely inactive life." There have been rumors lately of an "important job" awaiting him in England if his country



# Hitler Wanton Aggressor

Women and Children Air Raid Targets, **Embassy Charges** 

LONDON, Sept. 2.—(AP.)—Declaring that Germany "stands before the world as a wanton aggressor," the Polish Embassy in London today said "it is not only military objectives which are being bombed by the German military air force." The Embassy said:

"This morning German avia-tion again bombed unfortified towns, claiming many victims among the civilian population. "Contrary to the declaration of Herr Hitler, the above cities bombed are of no militeary importance whatsoever and the numerous casualties were all

among the civilian population, including women and children." It is said Polish anti-aircraft guns near Krakow brought down three German planes, four more were shot down near Gdynia, and near Chojnice Polish troops cap-

tured an armored German train. During an air raid on Warsaw this morning, the Embassy said, three women and two men were wounded by fragments of bombs, and "many" were killed or wounded when a train carrying women and children from the capital was bombed near Kutno, 60 miles


