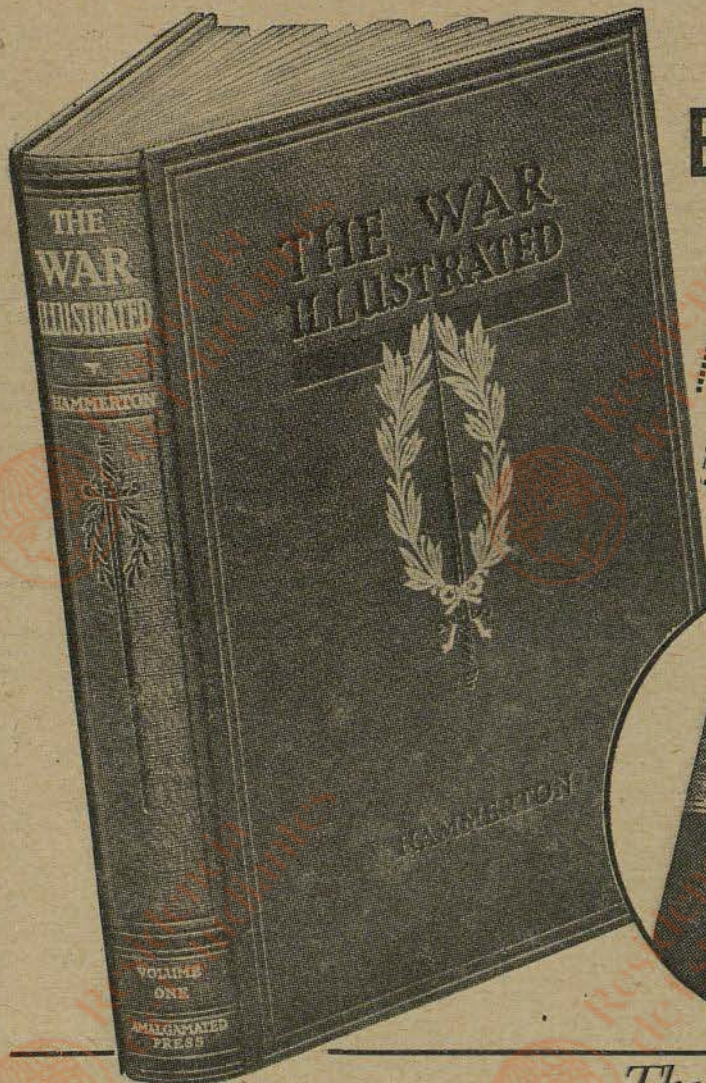

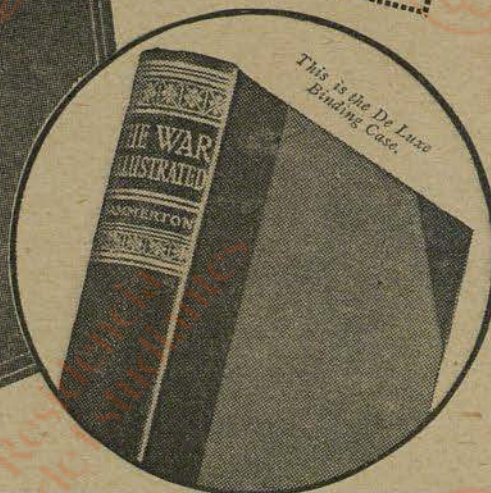

# The Publishers' Special BINDING SCHEME

for Our Subscribers

The publishers are prepared to bind Weekly Numbers into volume form for those subscribers who are unable to get this done speedily and efficiently in their own locality if the following conditions are observed.

Only Weekly Numbers in good condition—free from stains, tears, or other defacements—can be accepted for binding.

The copies to be bound must be packed securely in a parcel (Parts 1 to 20 constituting the first volume) containing the name and full postal address of the sender clearly written and posted direct to the Publishers' Binding Dept., or handed to your Newsagent for dispatch to them, the subscriber being liable for cost of carriage. If the parcel is sent direct to the Publishers, you must send remittance to cover the cost of the Binding Case and actual work of binding in a separate envelope, mentioning how many Numbers have been dispatched.

In this case payment should be made by cheque, postal order or money order (made payable to The Amalgamated Press, Ltd., and crossed / & Co.) sufficient to cover the full amount of the binding charges for this work. The name and address of the sender should be given in the letter as well as in the parcel, and the letter containing cheque or postal order must not be put in the parcel; post it separately.

If you hand your loose Numbers to your Newsagent for binding, you must at the same time pay him the full amount to cover the cost of the Binding Case and actual binding. Before packing the parcel it is advisable to make sure that nothing of value has been left between the leaves of the loose Numbers.

All above prices apply to Great Britain only. Readers in Eire will be required to pay such import duty as may be imposed by the Revenue Commissioners.

## The STANDARD BINDING

To bind Numbers 1 to 20 in the Publishers' Dark Red Cloth Binding Case with appropriate designs on the front and spine in two inks, the inclusive charge for binding in this style will be 5s. 6d. (2s. 6d. for the Binding Case and 3s. for the actual binding and cost of packing and return carriage).

## The DE LUXE BINDING

To bind Numbers 1 to 20 in the Publishers' Dark Blue half leather Binding Case with Blue Cloth sides and Blue Leather corners, with spine blocked in gilt and blind, also one headband and stained top to the leaves, the inclusive charge will be 10s. for the volume (6s. 6d. for the Binding Case and 3s. 6d. for the actual binding and cost of packing and return carriage).
